Rotarians are involved in international projects that seek to eliminate polio, provide clean water, improve literacy and offer disaster relief.

Rotary is a non-sectarian, non-political organization with members in 168 countries. Founded in 1905 by Paul Harris, a native Vermonter, Rotary is dedicated to service in each Rotarian's personal, business and community life.

Rotary Objectives

- Maintain high ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations and respect for each Rotarian's occupation.
- Apply the ideal of service in each Rotarians's personal, business and community life.
- Advance international understanding, goodwill and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

How Do I Become a Rotarian?

Membership in a Rotary Club is by invitation. Clubs meet weekly for fellowship and present interesting program speakers dealing with topics of local and global importance.

Requirements

Rotarians should be business owners, professionals, managers, retirees or community leaders.

Rotarians must attend 60% of the meetings to remain in good standing.

Rotarians should participate in one or more committees in their clubs.
